More bread and butter for schools

NEEDY schools can win an upgrade of their facilities as part of a R250 000 project which aims to help combat litter and help the environment through recycling.

The project will also empower the most needy and act as a catalyst for community involvement.

The Care 'n Share 2000 project is sponsored by Duens Bakery, a unit of the Sasko milling and baking division of the Pioneer Food Group.

The project will ensure the upgrading of at least five schools in the Cape Metropole and the schools which collect the most Duens plastic bags before Thursday June 15 will each ben-

efit by receiving an upgrade of facilities performed by volunteer students.

Schools in advantaged communities have the opportunity to share in the competition by collecting the bread bags on behalf of a needy school.

Schools which adopt a disadvantaged school must declare their respective partner to the organisers by Friday April 14.

Members of the public will also be able to support a school of their choice by calling 0839102303 and quoting a Duens bread barcode.

Proceeds of the calls will be added to the money allocated for the upgrade.
